## GENERAL RULES

- 1. All exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of The Berks County Fair.
- 2. The Fair Management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as its judgment may determine.
- 3. All articles must be pre-registered by sending your completed entry form (located in the back of the premium book) no later than June 27 of the current year for everything except animal entries. Animal entries are due June 1 of the current year to the following address: The Berks County Fair, % Jen Hartman 473 High Road, Kutztown PA 19530. For questions on Livestock Entries, please contact Ag Director Tammy Blatt, agdirector@theberkscountyfair.com.
- 4. Entries will be made according to classification. No more than one entry per subclass with the exception of livestock.
- 5. It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitors to make known the proper name of the article or breed of livestock being entered. Any item entered improperly will be automatically disqualified to receive a prize, but judges will make the correct name on the entry tag for the benefit of the owner so that the same mistake in entering will not be made again.
- 6. Reasonable care will be taken to protect all exhibits on display from all injury and damage but the fair is not, in any way, to be held responsible for accidents, loss of damage by water, fire, theft or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss.
- 7. Chairpersons of departments reserve the right to refuse or accept any entry. Furthermore, the chairpersons reserve the right to bar competition from animals, vegetables, flowers, poultry, products and manufactured articles of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition.
- 8. The Fair Management may, at any time, order the removal of any exhibit or part of the exhibit in bad condition and any article unfit to show.
- 9. Food products cannot be polluted with any substance or chemical that causes them to become poisonous and unfit to be used as food. NOTE: The Fair will notify the Pennsylvania Fair Fund in such a case and may void premiums that might have been awarded.
- 10. Premiums, as listed may be given for meritorious exhibits. In cases, where there is no competition, judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit worthy to receive. The same rule applies where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered. The judges may, at their discretion, award a prize or prizes such grade as the exhibit deserves. The decision of the judges shall be final in all cases except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation, or collusion, not discovered at the time of award, is proved. In such cases, the chairperson, manager, or secretary of the Fair or show, or such referee as they may appoint, may make the decision. These cases may be appealed to the Fair Management or Show Commission from whose decision there can be no appeal.
- 11. No exhibit may be removed at any time before the close of the Fair without permission from the Fair Board.
- 12. When award ribbons are stolen or destroyed, the exhibitor may receive a duplicate at the close of the fair which shall be supplied by the Fair, at no charge to the exhibitor. 6

## **GENERAL RULES CONTINUED**

- 13. During the judging, buildings and all judging areas with the exception of the livestock arena, will be closed to everyone except Fair officials, judges and necessary attendants. No exhibitors, or their agent shall communicate with the judge during the time of determining the awards, except to answer questions proposed by the judges. Any exhibitor interfering with the judges while making awards shall forfeit any premiums to which would otherwise be entitled.
- 14. All Livestock offered for premiums must be the property of the owner(s) for thirty (30) days or longer.
- 15. All Market animals will be weighed on the same set of scales under a qualified weighmaster chosen by the Fair.
- 16. No person shall be allowed in the ring while livestock is being judged except the judge, superintendents, and necessary attendants.
- 17. Should any animal awarded a prize be disqualified, the animals gaining the lower prize shall move into the next higher position, if in the opinion of the judges, the animals are worthy of such prizes.
- 18. Overfitting of cattle will be discriminated against. Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of an animal will disqualify it from competition.
- 19. When on exhibition in the ring, each animal must be under halter and the owner or employee must be in charge of the same.
- 20. Joint ownership is considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration papers.
- 21. Smoking in the barn or livestock tents is forbidden by rules and regulations of The Berks County Fair and these rules will be rigidly enforced at all times.
- 22. All dogs must be vaccinated on the property. For other animals and livestock, a rabies vaccine is recommended.
- 23. Entries are all surrounding counties as space permits, unless otherwise noted. Berks 4H and FFA exhibitors will have priority when space is limited.
- 24. Animals need to be in proper weight & body condition in order to be shown, or will be subject to disqualification by the Fair Board.
- 25. Exhibitors with camping trailers, tents, etc. <u>will not be permitted to use electric and water</u> <u>hookups.</u>
- 26. All checks will be mailed out within 10 days of the last day of the Fair. <u>Any discrepancies</u> <u>must be made to the Fair office within 5 days thereafter.</u> All checks must be cashed within 90 days of receipt or premiums will be reverted back to the Fair.
- 27. NO PARKING in pole barn areas.
- 28. In order to comply with Township ordinances and Insurance regulations, all electric cords used in the pole barns must meet National Electric Code Standards, which means that all cords must be grounded.
- 29. ABSOLUTELY NO set-up for livestock before Sunday, July 7, 2:00 PM; no animals will be allowed on the grounds until Tuesday, July 9 at 7:00 PM for Livestock. All animals must be on the grounds by Wednesday, July 10 at 10:00 AM.
- 30. Pop-up tents to prepare livestock for show are only allowed on the day of specific shows.
- 31. All exhibits including livestock are dismissed July 13 at 9:00 PM and must be off grounds July 14 by 10:00 AM.

## ALL PREMIUMS ARE SUBJECT TO CHANGE BASED ON FUNDING.

## **JUDGES & JUDGING**

1. Judges are earnestly requested to familiarize themselves with all rules and regulations of The Berks County Fair and to mark especially those rules bearing on the classes to be adjudicated by them. If any rule lacks clarity, attention should be called to it before judging. 2. The Judges must not award a prize to any unworthy exhibit. It is the intention of The Berks County Fair that no premium of distinction of any kind be given to any animal or article that is not deserving. In the event of a premium being withheld from any exhibit for that reason, the judge will write "not worthy" in the award column opposite such entry. In case there is no competition in a class, they will award a premium according to the merit of the animal or article as in their judgment the animal or article deserves.

3. The decision of the Judge shall be final in all classes.

4. No ties or duplicate placing can be awarded in any individual class.

## RULES

- 1. OWNERSHIP All Cattle must be owned by the exhibitor by June 1 of the current year.
- 2. ELIGIBILITY Any youth up to the age of 21 is eligible to compete. Exhibitors will be listed as of January 1st of the current year. Berks County Fair reserves the right to limit space and quantity of entrants. Berks County residents and local 4-H and FFA will be considered first.
- 3. CARE No bedding will be supplied. Feed, feed pans, water buckets, hay and any additional care items need to be provided by the exhibitor who must see that the animals are fed & cared for the ENTIRE fair. Exhibitors will be held solely responsible for any loss, injury or damage arising from any animal exhibited by him/her.
- 4. HEALTH REQUIREMENTS A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within 30 days is required. Entries showing clinical evidence of infections, contagious, or parasitic diseases or under quarantine for any disease shall not be admitted to the show. All entries must have an official identification including either a USDA-issued metal ear tag or an 840 RFID tag. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian for animals 3 months of age or older is recommended.
- 5. ALL dairy animals MUST BE DEHORNED, scurs will be acceptable!
- 6. Times Arrival will be on Tuesday of the fair between 7:00 9:00 PM and departure will be 9:00 PM Saturday of the Fair. ALL ANIMALS & EQUIPMENT MUST BE OFF THE GROUNDS BY 10:00 AM Sunday following the fair.
- 7. There will be a \$25 fee for each dairy animal scratched after July 1 of the current year.





- 1. In selecting vegetables for exhibition, choose such specimens that would bring the highest market price. Select uniform size specimens. If at all possible, do not mix varieties.
- 2. The following factors are generally used by an expert vegetable judge:
  - a. Trueness to variety type. If at all possible, pick the specimens from one variety.
  - b. Uniformity in shape, size and color.
  - c. Be sure to pick out a perfect specimen, then select the others as similar to it as possible. Never mix specimens of different maturity.
  - d. Protect from dirt, disease, infection and mechanical damage. Select specimens that are perfect and show no blemishes of any kind.
  - e. Condition and maturity. Be sure that exhibits are of high quality.
  - f. Potatoes should be washed.
  - g. Tomatoes should have stems removed.
  - h. Carrots, beets, etc. should have tops (leaves) removed from vegetables leaving about two (2) inches of stems
- 3. Any entry in paper or Styrofoam cups will be disqualified.
- 4. Parsley, Watercress and Herbs to be placed in clear glass pint jar in water.
- 5. Read premium material, carefully following all rules and regulations. If an entry calls for a specific number of specimens, be sure to exhibit that number; do not enter more or less. In any instance, your exhibits will be disqualified if the correct number of specimens is not entered.



**<u>RULES</u>** for local Fair and the PA Farm Show contests are as follows:

- 1. Open to any individual amateur baker who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
- 2. Entrants may <u>NOT</u> have won 1st place in this Blue Ribbon Apple Pie contest at any other fair in 2024.
- 3. The Apple Pie, including fillings and crust, must be **made from scratch with edible ingredients**. No pre-packaged ingredients may be used (*ex: no pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.*) Any decorations must just be edible.
- 4. Recipe **must include at least 60% apples in the filling**. It does not need to be a "traditional" two crusted apple pie and it can have a variety of fillings.

- 6. The recipe for the pie and pie crust must be submitted with the entry. It should be submitted on one side of 8 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" by 11" sheets of paper. The recipe must list all the ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. Entrant's name, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages. (All recipes and pies will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.)




